Places Worth Protecting - Haskill Basin

We've done it...now and for generations to come! We have conservation and recreation to both the east and the west of Whitefish Lake. Protecting Haskill Basin is a wonderful benefit for the City, our local economy, clean water, open views, wildlife, and the recreating public. We are lucky to live in a community that values conservation. Congratulations Whitefish!

The Haskill Basin easements have been finalized and adopted by the City of Whitefish. Many organizations including the Trust for Public Land, F.H. Stoltze Land and Lumber Company, Flathead Land Trust, and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks worked tirelessly with the City and WLP to orchestrate and execute this unique project that permanently protects 3,022 acres.

Funding for the project was secured through local community support, federal Forest Legacy Program, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Habitat Conservation Program, and a generous reduction in purchase price from F.H. Stoltze Land & Lumber. This project was only possible with help from from local residents as 84% of voters supported raising the tourist tax by 1%. Thank you all for supporting Haskill Basin and conserving this critical connection linking downtown to Big Mountain and beyond!

The Whitefish Trail in Haskill Basin

Building 5+ miles & 2 TH's

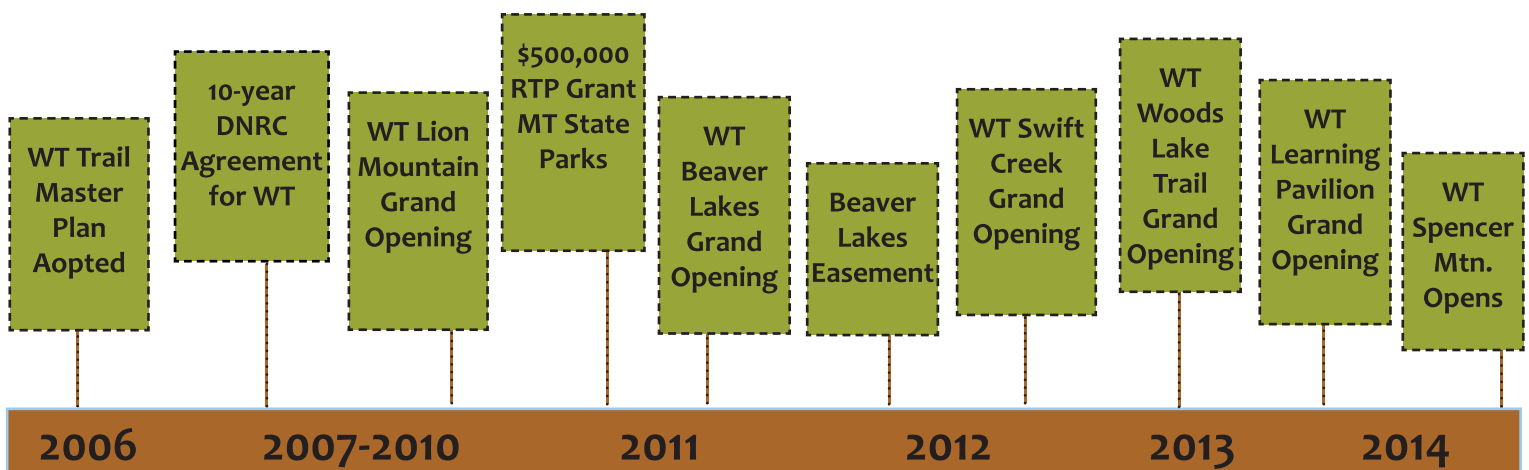
WLP and the City will construct a new trailhead at the water treatment facility on Reservoir Road within ½ mile of the City paved bike path on Wisconsin Ave. In partnership with Iron Horse HOA, Flathead Land Trust, Stoltze, and Whitefish Mountain Resort, a 5 ½ mile natural surface trail will be constructed Spring 2017. The trail will feature numerous scenic overlooks and family-friendly destinations along the trail.

The trail will connect to Whitefish Mountain Resort with a second trailhead on Big Mountain Road that will also serve as the “Winter” Whitefish Trail. The access will tie the Whitefish Trail to the groomed Nordic trails in partnership with the Glacier Nordic Club, Whitefish Mtn. Resort, Iron Horse, and Stoltze.

Thank you to all of our partners who have worked so hard to provide public recreational access in perpetuity and protect Haskill Basin forever.

Looking Forward...Closing the Loop on the Whitefish Trail

Our lives have been enriched by the Whitefish Trail, getting outside makes us healthier and happier, and WLP has helped to impact over 5,500 acres with community-driven conservation projects surrounding Whitefish Lake since 2006. WLP is eager to continue the momentum and pursue recreation and conservation challenges. We need an engaged community to identify opportunities to complete our *Vision 2020:Close the Loop* effort.

Vision 2020:Close the Loop will review the 2006 WT Master Plan to determine the best trail routes to connect Haskill Basin to Swift Creek and Beaver Lakes to Swift Creek across the railroad tracks. Our work will investigate recreation opportunities and will develop innovative conservation solutions as needed to address trail options, access, easement considerations, and potential threats with an emphasis on cost, financing, feasibility, phasing and opportunity.

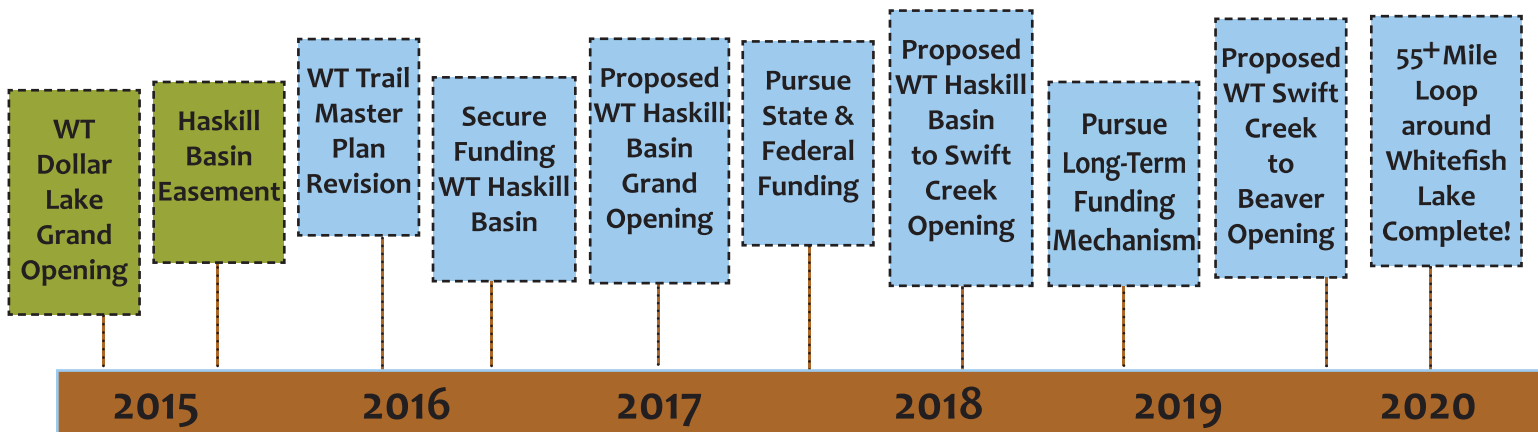
Vision 2020:Close the Loop will be the foundation of WLP's upcoming work. Trail planning and design, an outdoor recreation economic impact study, funding feasibility, conservation planning, community outreach and engagement, and fundraising are our *Vision2020* priorities. WLP is the community catalyst to develop a vision to complete the 55+ mile recreation loop trail circling Whitefish Lake, connecting our legacy, and connecting the Places Worth Protecting surrounding Whitefish.

In partnership with the community, Whitefish Mountain Resort, USFS, DNRC, MT State Parks, FWP, private landowners, and other key partners, Whitefish Legacy Partners will initiate the final connections of the Whitefish Trail to Close the Loop on the WT and Connect our Legacy.

FOSTERING EDUCATION

Whitefish Trail Learning Pavilion

Education programs on the Whitefish Trail offer a unique opportunity to cultivate connections between our community, our natural lands, and our outdoor heritage. WLP strives to reach a broad audience and 2016 will introduce our new Youth Photography Program, the WT Photo Contest, and our new Youth Bike Patrol. The WT Learning Pavilion continues to be an inspiring addition.



WLP's education programs enhance environmental awareness and teach the value of landscape-wide conservation and protected watersheds. Guided hikes and summer camps focus on natural history, forestry, ecology, outdoor skills, art in nature, health and fitness, and the joy of simply being outdoors.

5 school programs (3rd, 6th, 7th & 9th grades) + 15 summer youth programs = 800 youth
20 family-friendly guided hikes + 5 adult programs + 10 fitness programs = 350 adults

The success of our programs are thanks to our WT Naturalist, Kim Corette, and our engagement of local community volunteers who lead and assist our educational activities. Want to ride your bike and offer community service? Join the WT Youth Bike Patrol!

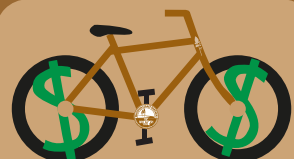
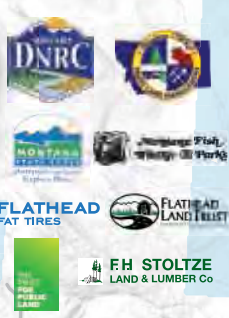

GROWING RECREATION

Building a Community Asset

Whitefish Legacy Partners has built over 36 miles of natural-surface trails and 10 trailheads. Locals and visitors have a variety of easy-to-locate and easy-to-navigate recreational opportunities on the Whitefish Trail. The WT was expanded in 2015 in the *Beaver Lakes* area at *Dollar Lake* and the historic *Spencer Mountain* area was incorporated into the Whitefish Trail system.

Dollar Lake

The new WT section includes over three miles of trails providing a variety of trail experiences for hikers, bikers, and equestrians. Highlights include connections to three scenic lakes - Dollar, Beaver & Little Beaver Lakes - with spectacular recreation opportunities and numerous loops. Dollar Lake offers parking and lake access for carry-in boats. Funding from a MT Tourism Infrastructure Investment Grant and a MT Recreational Trails Program Grant were matched with funds raised from the local community. Additionally, the Goguen Family donated a trail easement connecting the existing WT Overlook above Woods Lake to the new Dollar Lake trail.

Spencer Mountain

The Spencer WT is different than other sections - the trail utilizes historic logging roads and single-track trails with occasional sections of newly constructed trail. Two trailheads and an 8-mile loop provides wonderful serenity and picturesque overlooks of West Valley. RTP grant funding matched by community dollars supported trail construction, the temporary trailhead at Twin Bridges, and additional parking and information kiosk at South Spencer. Minor trail re-routes will take place in 2016, DNRC winter logging will continue another season, and a permanent trailhead at Twin Bridges will be constructed when the logging is complete. Concurrently, Flathead Fat Tires, is improving the adrenaline-filled freeride mountain biking trails that make Spencer so unique. Enjoy!

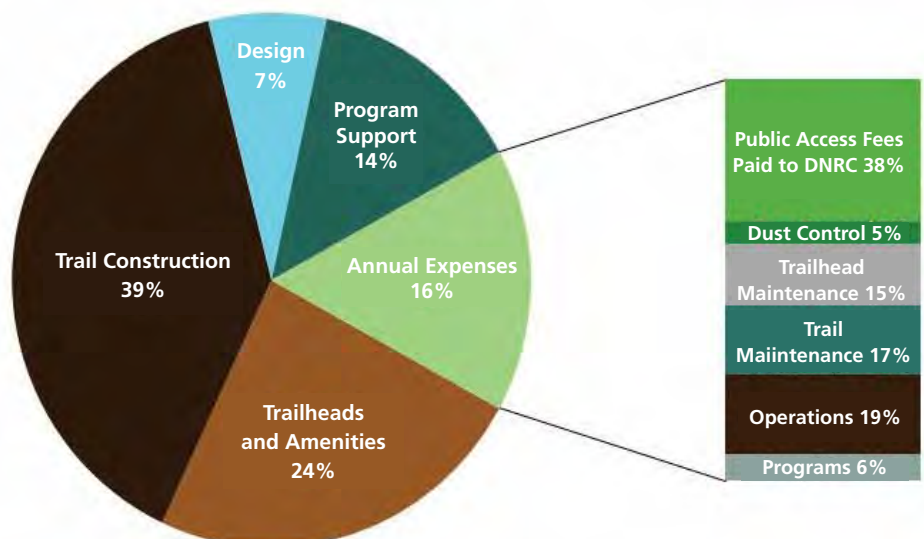

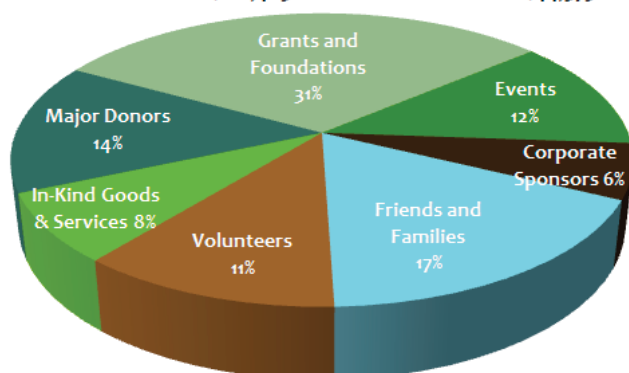

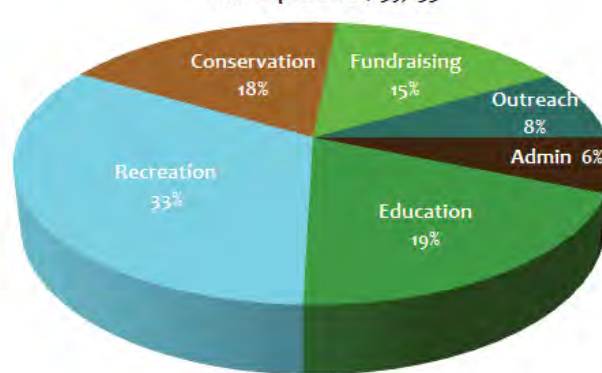
2015 Income
